Heritage of NADO Cooperation

- Reveal practical issues and share solutions
- Build anti-doping competence and professionalism in individuals
- Motivate staff and help retain them
- Facilitate testing of international-level athletes
- Prepare NADOs to become mentors to other organisations
- Improve information exchange in support of investigations
- Level the playing field for partner countries' international-level athletes
- Increase athlete confidence in global anti-doping
- Complement WADA activities by increasing programme quality

- Share best practices (especially on 2015 Code implementation and compliance)
- Treat anti-doping as a profession and as a life-long career

NADO Cooperation a Strategic Priority

ASADA Strategic Plan 2011-2014

 - Develop strong, trusting working relationships with government, domestic and international stakeholders within the anti-doping community, sport, and law enforcement.
- International engagement and influence
 - Contribute to building the capacity of developing anti-doping organisations, particularly in the Asia-Oceania region.

This site is developed to host information on (anti-)doping in the broadest sense of the word.

Who:

This site is developed and maintained by the Dutch National Anti-Doping Organisation (NADO), Anti-Doping Authority Netherlands (in Dutch: Dopingautoriteit). Dopingautoriteit, which was founded in 1989, is one of the oldest NADOs in the world. Doping.nl has been developed with the financial support of the Dutch Ministry for Health, Welfare and Sport.

Why?

The reason this website has been developed, is that we, Dopingautoriteit and the Ministry, consider it important to share relevant information relating to Anti-Doping. Disclosing and providing relevant information is one of the cornerstones in the fight against doping in sport. However, practice shows that a significant amount of information is currently not available, or only available to a limited group of users. This explains our decision to share all relevant much anti-doping information via one site: Doping.nl.

What?

Dopingautoriteit aims to (continue to) provide as much information through this website as possible. While information will be varied, the main focuses will be: WADA documents like the World Anti-Doping Code, the International Standards like the Prohibited List, Doping Regulations, (abstracts of) scientific articles, decisions by disciplinary bodies (mainly, but not limited to CAS awards). In addition to making documents available, it is the intention of Dopingautoriteit to provide searchable documents when possible, and to add relevant keywords to ensure easy access.

In the future, Doping.nl will also serve as digital archive, where one can find older information which is not available anymore elsewhere.

For whom?

This site is designed for use by anti-doping professionals, such as NADOs and International Federations, but also for students, journalists and other people interested in the subject.

2015 Code Implementation

- We all have the same implementation challenges – so we can save ourselves time and effort by sharing how we:
 - Manage implementation (and how to maintain ongoing programmes)
 - Educate/engage domestic stakeholders, including athletes, support personnel, government colleagues, and the media and the public
 - Plan, budget and train for new functions (such as improved risk assessment, specialised testing menus, TUE management and intelligence & investigations)

2015 Code Implementation

- The 2015 Code requires more substantial cooperation between ADOs:
 - Article 4.4 (TUE recognition – see also 2015 ISTUE)
 - Articles 5.2 – 5.4 (Testing)
 - Article 14.5 (ABP information sharing)
 - Article 15.1.1 (recognition of ADO decisions)
 - Article 20 (ADO cooperation for investigations)
- The 2015 ISTI requires more cooperation between ADOs:
 - Part III, Article 11 (gathering and sharing intelligence)
 - Annex I.2.3 (sharing whereabouts information)
 - Annex J (ADO cooperation for event testing)

2015 Code Implementation

- Review your current relationships with other ADOs
- Establish new ADO relationships in areas where you need help
 - For example: with key IFs or MEO concerning TUEs and testing
 - For example: with more experienced NADOs on ABP
- Have information sharing arrangements with key ADOs (and have simple agreements to document them)
 - For example: for sharing intelligence or ABP information
 - For example: see model agreements on iNADO website
- Decide on sources of anti-doping decisions to help you administer your new anti-doping rules
 - For example: to decide on flexible sanctions under Art. 10

2015 Code Implementation

- Share your planning with one other NADO
- Collaborate with one IF
- Offer to be a “buddy” or mentor for a smaller or less-developed NADO/RADO
- Share the issues your stakeholders raise, and your solutions, through international fora such as WADA, iNADO and Sport Accord
- Offer to host informal regional meetings or teleconferences of experts on implementing prevention, testing, results management, TUEs, I&I, to find common approaches – and share the outcomes of those meetings

Anti-Doping as a Profession

- Continual professional development of staff (annual staff retreats, external training courses, event de-briefs, ISO internal audit teams, etc.)
- Second or loan staff to other NADOs (JADA and CCES, ASADA and AD Switzerland, CHINADA and WADA, etc.)
- Visit other NADOs (NADA Germany and USADA, etc.)
- Providing services and staff to major event organisations (ASDA and 2000 Olympics/Paralympics, UKAD and 2014 Commonwealth Games, CCES and 2015 Pan-American and Para-panamerican Games, KADA and 2018 Olympics/Paraympics, JADA and 2020 Olympics/POaralympics)
- Special projects (WADA IO and Outreach Teams, secondment to sport ministry, etc.)
